Alcoholic beverage producers certainly don't want consumers to associate drinking with mental retardation, alcoholism, cirrosis of the liver, and death on the highways. So instead of informing drinkers about health and safety risks, they bombard us with \$2 billion worth of slick promotional campaigns annually.

According to Neil Postman, professor of media ecology at New York University, and his colleagues, children see more than 100,000 beer commercials on television before they are old enough to legally drink and drive. The ads do more than sell particular brands; they sell the assumption that drinking is not just safe, but essential to a happy. successful life.

Industry officials often argue that warnings on their products would ultimately lead to warnings on everything from eggs to underwear. It's a cute argument, but it just doesn't wash. Only two products - alcohol and tobacco - are potentially addictive and sold legally directly to consumers despite their destructive impact on our nation's health.

Thelma Klingensmith gave an update on referral of gambling measures 1184 (off-track betting) and 1641 (electronic gaming machines). Petition circulator must witness signing of petition and be sure it is complete. They hope for 26,000 signatures by June 19.

Rev. Jim Kraemer, Mandan Nazarene Church, was the speaker using II Thessalonians 2:13-17. Through Christ we pray, know the truth, stand fast, are comforted and established in good word and work. He held four sad funerals for young people who died because of liquor, drugs, and following the crowd. He preached the gospel message that led to serious questions from the young people.
