Mrs. Serge Dubovoy gave a report on the history of Mother's Day along with the devotional from The Union Signal. Our speaker for the day was Mrs. Gordon Olson, a vivacious dynamic orator. She gave a very enlightning address on Humanism.

In the morning devotions that Rev. Menry Bahrenburg, Jr. read from the hook of Esther, challenged the WCTU to have the courage of Esther and continue the fight against alcohol and drugs.

Thelma Klingensmith reported on Mid Year meeting held in Jamestown, Polis 6. The State Convention will be in Jamestown October 4 and 5.

Steele report given by Winnie DeKrey included placing YTE inserts in the bulletins of 10 churches in the area, booth at county fair, and Bible verse,

thought, and prayer in the local paper.

Report from Bismarck Union told of making charts using Glossary of Bills in Union Signal to encourage other people as well as WCTU members to contact North Dakota representatives and senators on how to vote on important bills (by phoning Federal Building in Bismarck - 255-4011 and asking for their office; provided YTS inserts for two churches; and gave out leaflets at Christmas craft sale.

For the afternoon devotions Mrs. Bahrenburg read Luke 14:25-35 and told about their prison ministery which started 15 years ago. She compared a shoe and a person (sole or soul, tongue, eye, etc.). She closed with the poem "The Touch of the Master's Hand". Rev. and Mrs. Bahrenburg

sang "Living for Jesus."

Thelma Klingensmith was the speaker and talked about prayer. She stressed the need for 13,500 signatures to get the petition to close bars at 11 p.m. instead of 1 a.m. on the November ballot. This would lessen the drinking driver problem and other abuses caused by alcohol. The WCTU has promised 200,000 to ban alcohol ads on TV.

The following elected district officers- President Edna Jenson, Vice President Olga Huhncke, Secretary Verna Ellsworth, and Treasurer Marion Brusven- were installed by Mrs. Emma Pfaff.

The following sweet little ones - Robert DeKrey, Nathan Shipley, Michael and Anne DeKrey, Tyler Fischer, and Caleb Shipley were the White Ribbon Recruits. This service closed with singing "Jesus Loves Me".

Delicious morning and afternoon lunch and noon meal were served by the Steele Union.

Television is not only for entertainment, it is also a powerful instrument for health education and prevention.

For example, research shows that if young people see television stars smoking or drinking, they tend to perceive that the cultural environment is favorable to the activity shown on the screen.

Researchers who sampled three decades of television shows ranging from "Leave it to Beaver" to "Dallas" have concluded that drinking is up during prime time, but smoking is down.

Their review of "Twilight Zone," Mason," "Alice," "MASH" all told, more than 280 hours of situation comedies and dramas, found 10-fold drop in TV smoking since 1950. But during the same period, on the air drinking has risen dramatically.
