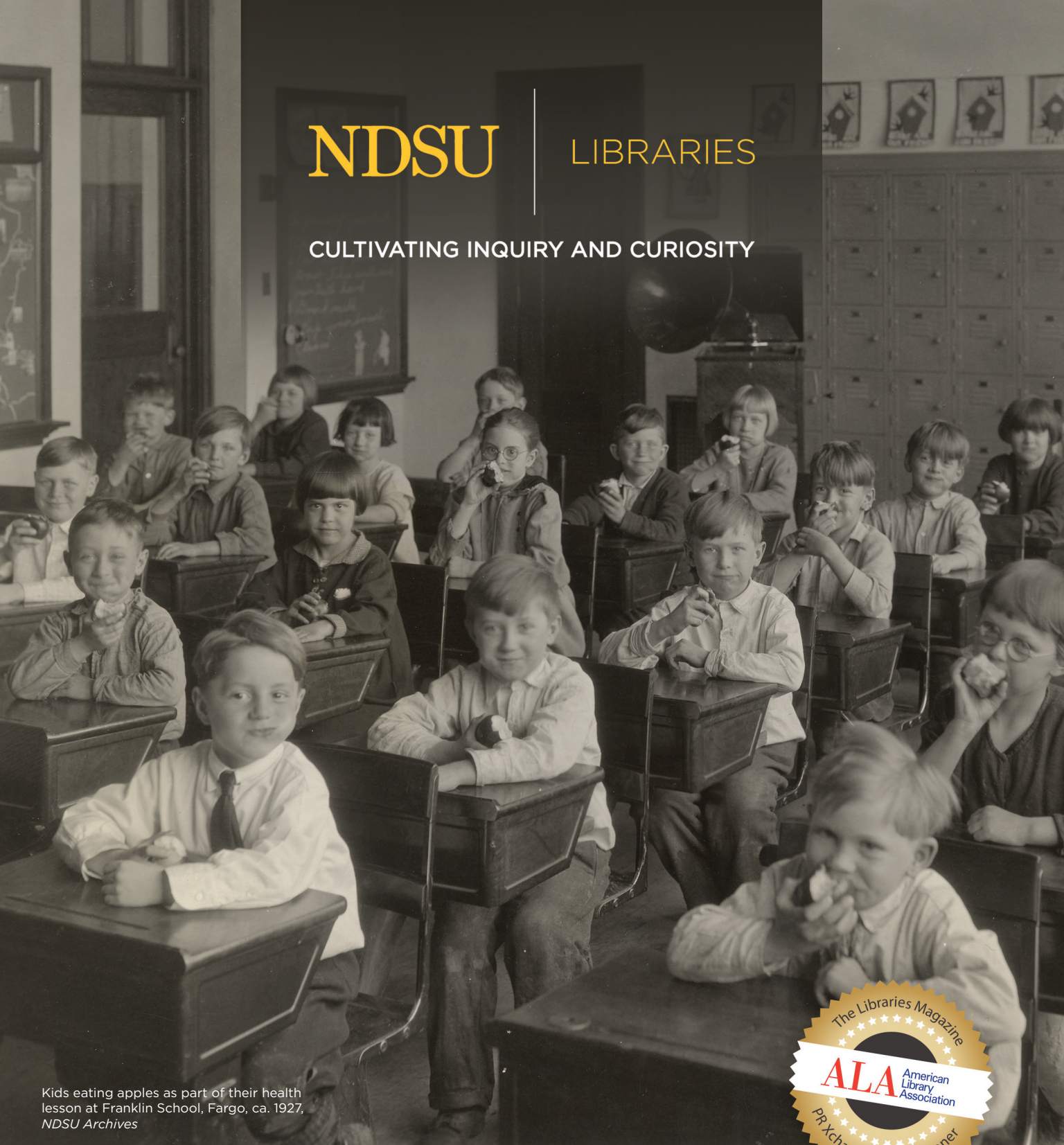

NDSU Libraries Take Action on Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion

NDSDU Libraries staff have long valued and desired to increase the Libraries' engagement with issues around equity, diversity, and inclusion. The shattering events of spring 2020 created a new sense of urgency around taking meaningful and concrete steps to actively support the NDSU community's efforts in these areas. In response, a library committee was formed to craft a statement of equity, diversity, and inclusion. This statement is meant to publicly affirm the values of NDSU Libraries and to provide a framework for accountability and continuous improvement (see p.5).

Beth Twomey, Head of Research and Instruction and committee chair stated, "Establishing the Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion committee demonstrates NDSU Libraries' commitment to taking positive action towards creating a truly inclusive environment for the campus community."

Next steps include gathering feedback from relevant stakeholders, seeking campus collaborations to provide programming, exhibits, and other projects that reflect the diversity of our campus community, and providing professional development opportunities for Libraries staff. What follows are some highlights about our engagement with these important issues from the past year.

TRI-COLLEGE UNIVERSITY LIBRARIES WORKSHOP 2021: STRATEGIES FOR SHIFTING LIBRARY CULTURES

Dr. Anne Phibbs, founder and president of Strategic Diversity Initiatives, provided a two-day workshop to 265 attendees from the Tri-College University Libraries about the historical and institutional inequalities that hinder equity in the workplace. At the presentation titled "Beyond Diversity 101: Micro-inequities, Implicit Bias, and Moving toward Equity," participants learned to identify and break down barriers and challenges that impede a library's ability to provide truly inclusive spaces, services, and working environments.

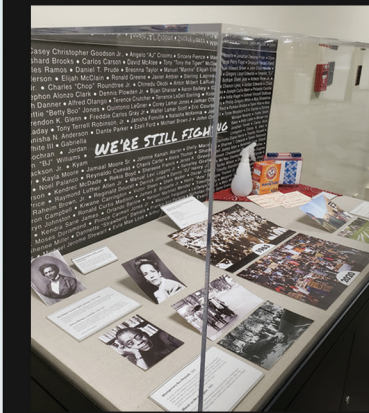
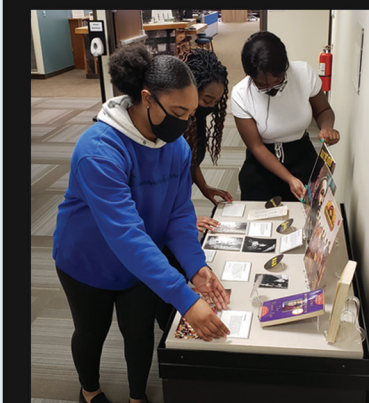
THIS IS NOT AN EXHIBIT

Moved by the protests of spring and summer 2020, NDSU Libraries staff members created an interactive exhibit of art and graphics to convey a simple message: "This is not an exhibit. We need to stop and pay attention to the world around us. Ask yourself: What should I be doing?" Viewers were encouraged to share their thoughts on sticky notes and leave them on the wall for others to read.

BLACK AMERICA: THE STORY WE'LL TELL

Created by NDSU Black Student Association members Gabrielle Clavo, Courtland Garrison, Kayla Jones, and Britney Kwateng, the Main Library is hosting an exhibit that shares their stories. Exhibit themes include the evolution of Black arts and culture, military service, Black fatherhood, and the protest for equal rights. Kayla Jones stated, "I believe it is important that we showcase our influence in this nation. While a lot of our history has to do with fighting for our rights—and even presently fighting for our rights—a lot of our history is rooted in arts and culture and I'm so glad we got to show that. My hope is that each person that walks by the exhibit learns something new." The exhibit will be on view through 2021.

During National Suicide Prevention Month in September 2020, the Libraries hosted an event sponsored by Prairie St. John's to bring awareness to suicide and remind students that a positive state of mind starts with being good to yourself. During these unprecedented times, mental health care and awareness is more important than ever.

At the event, students and others were encouraged to take an online mental health test (screening.mhanational.org/screening-tools) to determine if they were experiencing symptoms of a mental health condition. Additional resources were available, including tools to ground oneself when feeling stressed or anxious.

Librarians Support NDSU Community

NDSU librarians thrive on engagement with students and faculty in the academic departments they serve to advance research, teaching, and learning. They are among the most visible faces representing the Libraries on campus as they attend capstone presentations and faculty lectures, serve as judges for events like the W Challenge and NDSU Explore, meet new students during Welcome Week events, and a variety of other opportunities.

Providing through Outreach

A great example of outreach is our work with NDSU Agriculture and Extension. Nicole Juve, Agricultural Sciences Librarian, is responsible for serving these areas and takes her efforts to another level. She has visited each of the seven Research Extension Centers located across the state to attend field tours and meet with Extension staff to better support their research. Nicole provides in-depth research consultations and library resources specifically chosen for Extension researchers. These are services she discovered were much-needed after surveying faculty and staff of Extension, the Experiment Stations, and the College of Agriculture, Food Systems, and Natural Resources. While Nicole's office is located on campus, her workplace is the whole of North Dakota.

Encouraging Collaboration

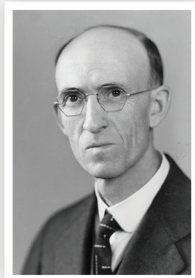
One of the Libraries' most well-established collaborations is with the English department's First Year Writing program. Each year NDSU librarians, led by Maddison Melquist, Humanities Librarian, and Beth Twomey, Head of Research and Instruction, meet with these courses to provide students with instruction in using the library and critically evaluating information. Extending this collaboration further, several librarians recently co-wrote a chapter on library research that is included in the English department's own textbook for the course (see p.13). This has allowed the librarians to design a lesson plan in close alignment with the book chapter and better assess student learning.

Supporting Teaching and Learning

When the COVID-19 pandemic curtailed in-person classes, librarians pivoted to provide research and instruction services in accordance with the HyFlex model of course delivery. HyFlex requires that a mix of synchronous, asynchronous, and in-person learning is available to every student. The librarians—already veterans at providing instruction in a variety of formats—adapted existing lessons and developed new ones, making the most of available technology to create engaging active learning content to support students' research.

2020 Gunlogson Presentation: *The Legacy of a Life in Botany*

On October 15, NDSU Libraries hosted the 2020 Gunlogson Presentation via Zoom. Assistant Professor Laura Aldrich-Wolfe and Associate Professor Steven Travers, both of the department of Biological Sciences, discussed botanical history and their efforts to update the *Handbook of North Dakota Plants* for the 21st Century.



First published in 1950, the *Handbook of North Dakota Plants* was the inaugural publication of the NDSU Press and remains the only published book of the flora of North Dakota. The book's author, O.A. Stevens (left), was Professor of Botany at North Dakota Agricultural College from 1909 to 1956. Stevens' book reflects North Dakota's location at the geographical center of North America and its historical role as the gateway to the West.

Aldrich-Wolfe stated, "Dr. O.A. Stevens incorporated personal anecdotes and information on amateur botanists throughout the original Handbook. In revising it, our goal is to maintain that sense of connection with the history of botany and the lives of botanists in North Dakota, while updating the nomenclature and information to make the book more useful to the contemporary reader."

The Gunlogson Fund supports scholarly work related to the publications and archives of the Institute for Regional Studies, advancing general university outreach.

Special Collections

While the library is the heart of a university campus, the special collections are its soul. They tell the story of an institution by preserving and providing access to its unique history and culture. As a land grant institution, North Dakota State University's story goes beyond campus to encompass our state, the land, and its people. Our Special Collections—the NDSU Archives and the Germans from Russia Heritage Collection—tell that story.

The NDSU Archives consist of two collections: the Institute for Regional Studies Archives and the University Archives. Founded in 1950, the Institute for Regional Studies Archives focuses on the history of North Dakota and the Red River Valley and is one of the most significant historical collections in the state. Its strengths include historical agricultural collections, bonanza farm and pioneering records, Nonpartisan League political collections, ethnic and cultural collections, urban and governmental records for Fargo and Cass County, and a rich photograph collection containing over 700,000 images, with a focus on photojournalism. The Institute for Regional Studies is also home to the music collection of North Dakota native and American cultural icon Lawrence Welk. The University Archives is the repository for NDSU's historic records and artifacts. Its collections contain the papers of some of our institution's most prominent professors and their groundbreaking research dating back

to the founding of NDSU, then known as the North Dakota Agricultural College. The collections also support the university's land grant mission through its holdings of NDSU Extension and Agricultural Experiment Station records.

The Germans from Russia Heritage Collection collects, documents, preserves, promotes, and makes accessible resources on the culture, history, folklore, textiles and clothing, and foodways of the Germans from Russia. Its focus is on Bessarabian, Black Sea, Crimean, Dobrudscha and Volhynian Germans and their descendants in North Dakota and the Northern Plains. Since its inception in 1978, this specialized archive has become one of the most comprehensive collections of German-Russian resources in the world.

As the keepers of our unique heritage, the NDSU Special Collections serve as a point of pride for NDSU, the Libraries, and our community.

A Virtual Program and Online Exhibit to Honor Leo Kim

In 2019, the NDSU Archives were honored to become the home of *The Leo Kim Collection*. Leo, a distinguished photographer and former NDSU student, is best known for his striking images of the North Dakota landscape. To mark this occasion, the Libraries partnered with the NDSU Department of Communication to host a virtual program celebrating Leo’s life and work.

Local photographers inspired by Leo gathered on Zoom in April 2021 to discuss his achievements and impact in the community. Dr. Ross Collins, Professor of Communication, chaired the panel. Panelists included Colburn Hvidston III, former photo department manager at *The Forum* for 35 years; Dan Koeck, former NDSU University Relations photographer for 24 years; Dave Samson, long-time photographer with *The Forum* and *West Fargo Pioneer/Midweek* publications; and Dave Wallis, photographer with *The Forum* for 40 years.

Wallis stated, “Leo Kim was one of the very most influential people in my life. He had an extremely high bar of quality. He would spend so much time working to make a photograph, no matter whether the subject was a machine part or a landscape. It’s wonderful that his legacy is being archived and made available for viewing.”

The virtual program coincided with the launch of the online exhibit *A Photographic Journey: The Life*

& *Work of Leo Kim*, which shares details of Leo’s life and examples of his photographs. The well-received exhibit was created by NDSU Department of Communication graduate student Noah Petters with assistance from NDSU Archives volunteer Mike Smith and NDSU Libraries staff members.

Digital Scholarship Initiative Supports Research and Collaboration at NDSU

As the research lifecycle increasingly makes use of digital evidence and methods, students and faculty need additional support for their research assignments, projects, and goals. In response, NDSU Libraries have been working to develop a digital scholarship initiative that will incorporate new and existing services and resources within the Libraries, as well as strengthen and develop partnerships throughout NDSU. We are pleased to announce that the first of these new services and resources has launched this fall with the Data Visualization Lab.

The NDSU Foundation awarded the Libraries a \$46,000 Impact Fund Grant in October 2020 to establish a lab on the upper floor of the Main Library. Hallie Pritchett, Interim Dean of Libraries, stated, "The Data Visualization Lab was designed to foster and encourage multidisciplinary research and collaboration." Available to all students, faculty, and staff, the lab includes dual monitor workstations and a SMART Board that can be used for instruction or collaborative projects, movable tables to allow for multiple configurations of the space, and a variety of statistical, visualization, and GIS (Geographic Information System) software that will allow students to effectively interpret, manipulate, and visualize data for projects and assignments. Space has also been reserved to construct virtual reality labs that are expected to open in 2022.

Also new for the fall is our 3D laser scanner lending service. In February 2021, a group of NDSU faculty and Libraries staff received financial support from the ND EPSCoR State Office STEM grants program to purchase two portable 3D laser scanners that are available for checkout to all faculty,
