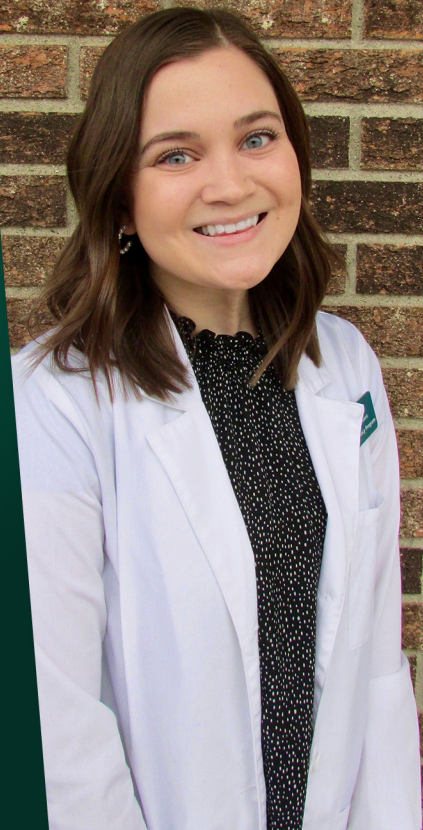

In spring 2022, the NDSU Libraries Undergraduate Research Award (LURA) was awarded to Brianna O'Gary. This award recognizes excellence in the use of library resources in completing an undergraduate research project. Brianna's project is titled "Medication Safety and Opioid Risk Screenings Conducted by Nurses in Patients' Homes" (co-authored with Dr. Heidi Eukel, professor of pharmacy practice) and was published in the April 2022 issue of *The North Dakota Nurse*.

Brianna is a third-year pharmacy student at NDSU. For students who are not as familiar with library resources, Brianna recommends starting with the Libraries' website. She states, "They have a lot of easy-to-follow instructions on how to begin your research. I would also recommend contacting your subject's librarian for further assistance. I met with the Health Sciences Librarian [Merete Christianson], and she gave me amazing tips and tools that I will continue to use throughout my pharmacy career!"

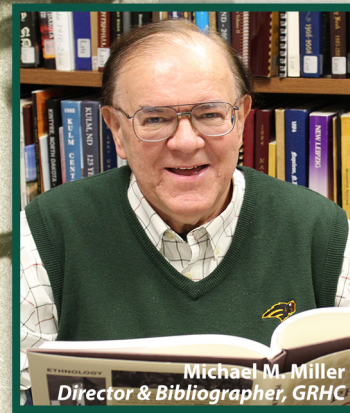

# MICHAEL MILLER SET TO RETIRE AFTER 55 YEARS AT NDSU

Michael M. Miller, Director and Bibliographer of the Germans from Russia Heritage Collection (GRHC), is set to retire on December 1, 2022, after over 55 years at NDSU. Michael joins Henry L. Bolley and C. B. Waldron as the longest serving employees in NDSU history.

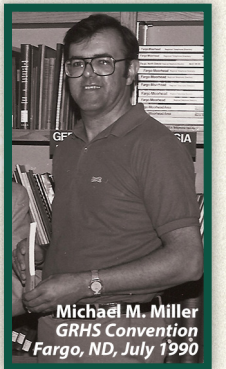
An August 1967 story in the *Emmons County Record* reads, "A Strasburg native has been named to the faculty of North Dakota State University, Fargo. Michael M. Miller, son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter P. Miller, was appointed by Pres. H. R. Albrecht. Miller will teach library science, act as circulation librarian, and handle the library displays."

In 1978, President Laurel D. Loftsgard called Michael into his office and asked him to create the Germans from Russia Heritage Collection. Michael was named Bibliographer and later Director.

Michael has many accomplishments from his long and distinguished career. Since 1996, he has written a monthly newspaper column, *In Touch with Prairie Living*, for North and South Dakota weekly newspapers; his column is also preserved in the NDSU Repository. According

to Michael, "I'll continue the column as long as I'm healthy." Michael has been executive producer on ten award-winning documentaries for Prairie Public that have shared the story, heritage, and culture of the Germans from Russia community. He led twenty-three Journey to the Homeland Tours, a heritage tour to Germany and Ukraine. Over 700 people have joined him to visit their ancestral villages in Ukraine. Other accomplishments include his instrumental role in securing the Lawrence Welk Collection for the NDSU Archives, leading the Dakota Memories Oral History Project, helping create the Tri-County Tourism Alliance, and serving as President of the Friends of the Welk Homestead.

Over the years, Michael's work has been recognized by a number of associations and organizations. In 1990, he received the Distinguished Service Award from the Mountain Plains Library Association. He was named 2008 Librarian of the Year by the North Dakota Library Association, and in 2010 received the Heritage Honor Award from the State Historical Society of North Dakota. In 2018, Michael received a Friend of Extension award from the Upsilon Chapter of Epsilon Sigma Phi.

According to Jeremy Kopp, GRHC Outreach and Operations Coordinator, "Michael has had a strong personal impact on my life and career through his support, mentorship, and friendship since 2010. His ability to develop and foster relationships is something I hope to carry forward at the GRHC and NDSU Libraries."

To ensure his legacy, Michael established an endowment for the GRHC by designating the NDSU Foundation as beneficiary of his retirement account. The endowment will provide perpetual funding for staffing and projects dedicated to collecting, preserving, and sharing stories about Germans from Russia in North Dakota.

"NDSU is a land grant university for its people and its heritage. That's one of the reasons I think this collection is so important here," Michael said. "I hope that as a legacy, my gift and my service to NDSU inspires others with a deep passion for their ethnic roots to give to the GRHC."

According to Michael, "My lifelong dream has been to preserve, document, and enrich the heritage and culture of our Germans from Russia community." NDSU Libraries are honored to have helped Michael fulfill his dream.

In the spring of 2022, the Digital Fabrication Lab completed the second phase of its renovation process, which included the creation of the adjoining CoLab. The CoLab is a collaborative workspace designed to foster creative experiences and connections. It features modular furniture that allow students, faculty, and staff to arrange the space to fit their needs. The CoLab was designed in part by NDSU Interior Design students Kendra Borgen, Carolyn Hoffmann, Parker Johnson, Jesse Price, and Hannah Schumacher, with oversight by Program Coordinator Dr. Susan Ray-Degges and the Libraries' Emerging Technologies Coordinator Adam Elznic.

"We are excited to feature a space that was designed by students, for students," Elznic stated. "It was a great professional development experience to have students design a custom space. Since its reopening, we have had great student involvement and the layout has delivered on its promise of fostering collaboration and supporting our educational and entrepreneurial pursuits."

The final phase of the project will include installation of an interactive SMART Board in the CoLab and the creation of a glass façade to tie Digital Fabrication Lab and the CoLab together. 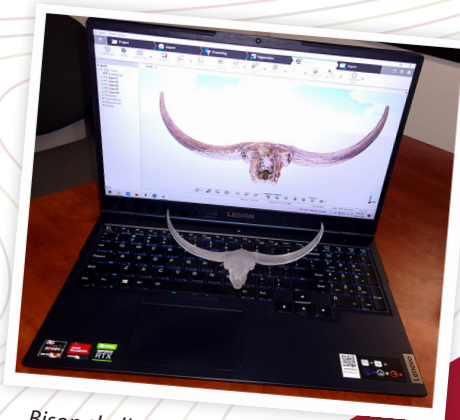
## DATA VISUALIZATION LAB

Since its opening in the fall of 2021, our Data Visualization Lab (DVL) has seen a steady stream of NDSU users looking for help with data visualization. The space came together over the summer when our virtual reality labs were moved to the DVL, making it easier to assist users with this technology. Interest in the Libraries' ND EPSCoR-funded 3D laser scanners has also increased, with students using them for senior design projects and student club projects.

Based on the success of the DVL and our 3D laser scanner lending service, this fall the Libraries and the NDSU Department of Earth, Environmental, and Geospatial Sciences received an NDSU Foundation Impact Fund Grant to purchase an Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (a quadcopter drone) and a differential GPS system that will be available to all NDSU students and researchers. Like the scanners, the drone and GPS system will be handled by the DVL.

The DVL is managed by Sciences Librarian Bob Tolliver. We are fortunate to have Charlie Nixon, PhD student in Environmental and Conservation Sciences, as our graduate assistant for the DVL. He is a with expertise in GIS and provides most of the consulting help in the lab. In addition to his skills with GIS, he has developed expertise with our 3D scanners and processing the scans for use with 3D printers.

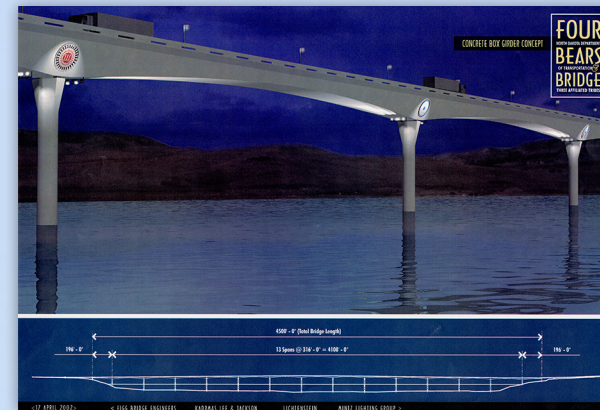
*Bison skull scanned with our 3D laser scanner; 3D model rendered in the DVL and printed in the DFL*

# New Collections at the NDSU Archives

## DENBY M. DEEGAN (SURROUNDED BY ENEMY) ARCHITECTURAL DRAWINGS



Architectural drawings by Denby M. Deegan, *Surrounded by Enemy*, were donated by his family to the NDSU Archives in the summer of 2021. Deegan, a 1965 NDSU graduate, had a distinguished career as one of the first Native American registered architects in the United States and in North Dakota. His career spanned 45 years and included work throughout the country, the majority of which was in North Dakota and Montana. Much of his work incorporated themes and motifs of Arikara culture and heritage. Deegan was a founding member of the American Indian Council of Architects and Engineers (AICAE), a non-profit organization designed to encourage and mentor the development of Native American architects and engineers.

## FARGO AIR MUSEUM PARTNERSHIP

In April 2022, the Fargo Air Museum and NDSU Archives began a partnership that will allow the museum's collection of photographs and paper documents to be preserved and shared with the community. The Fargo Air Museum was founded with the nonprofit mission of promoting aviation through education, preservation, and restoration. Items from their collections will be available for students, researchers, and the general public to view, learn from, and enjoy.

Fargo Air Museum Collections Manager Max Sabin stated, "As an NDSU history graduate, I am beyond excited to see my alma mater and the Fargo Air Museum join in partnership to not only preserve an extensive rare photo archive and unique document collection but to see it shared with the public as well."

## PRESENTATION SISTERS OF THE SACRED HEART CONVENT COLLECTION



The archives of the Presentation Sisters of the Sacred Heart Convent were donated to the NDSU Archives in fall 2021. The Presentation Sisters have been the carriers of the Presentation Story—the completion of Mary's purification in accordance with Jewish law and the presentation of the birth of the first born—from their arrival in the United States to establishing a foundation in the Dakota Territory in 1880. The collection includes information on Nano Nagle, founder of the order; the establishment of the order in Fargo; and materials related to their educational ministry, health care, and social services activities.
