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ABSTRACT

The focus is on designing a Culturally Responsive Sustainable Cultural District in Aden, Yemen. A region historically known as "Arabia Felix" or "Happy Arabia". The intent is to evoke the region's historical happiness and unity, using modern Islamic architecture as a vehicle for cultural expression and cohesion. The research will investigate why Aden is an ideal site for this project, the importance of this development for the people of Yemen, and how it can serve as a solution to the problem of divisive nationalism.


1.1.1. Characteristics of Nationalism





Yemen ethnic composition (2000)




Outside temperature


Precipitation (rainfall)



1.2.4. Economic Overview and Trade





The goal was to ensure that the design not only reflects the rich cultural heritage of Yemen but also promotes unity among its people.

2.6. Synthesis and Application

The synthesis of the collected data informed the design process of the proposed cultural district. The insights gained from the cultural events, in particular, were pivotal in shaping a design that celebrates cultural diversity while fostering a sense of community and belonging. The district is envisioned to be a space where cultural expressions from various communities can coexist harmoniously, thereby promoting peace and unity.

The methodology adopted for this research was comprehensive and dynamic, tailored to explore the intricate relationship between architecture, nationalism, and cultural unity. By integrating theoretical research with practical experiences from diverse cultural settings, the project aims to propose an architectural space in Aden that not only respects the historical and cultural significance of the region but also serves as a beacon of unity and cultural diversity.

3. Case studies

3.1. West Kowloon Cultural District

The West Kowloon Cultural District (WKCD) in Hong Kong is a large-scale urban development project that has faced significant challenges and controversies throughout its planning and implementation stages. Here are more details on this case study:

The WKCD project was first proposed in 1998 with the aim of transforming a former industrial area into a world-class cultural hub. However, the planning process was marred by disputes over the project's cultural significance, design, development approach, and the level of public participation. From 1998 to 2013, the project underwent several years of negotiations involving various stakeholders with differing interests, including government agencies, cultural organizations, urban planners, and community groups. The lack of proper public consultation and limited opportunities for participation led to widespread opposition and criticism.

In early 2006, the project faced a major setback when it was suspended due to the controversies surrounding its planning process. However, the Hong Kong government later revived the project by adopting a statutory-body development approach, establishing the West Kowloon Cultural District Authority (WKCDA) to oversee its implementation.


Construction of the WKCD finally commenced in 2013, with a focus on enhancing the permeability and connectivity of the area. The project aimed to create a vibrant cultural district with world-class facilities for the performing arts, museums, and public spaces. Despite the challenges faced during the planning stages, the WKCD project highlights the importance of

inclusive and transparent public consultation processes in large-scale urban development projects. It also underscores the need to balance cultural significance, design considerations, and stakeholder interests to ensure successful implementation and community acceptance.

The WKCD case study serves as a valuable lesson for future urban development projects, emphasizing the significance of effective stakeholder engagement, public participation, and a clear vision that aligns with the cultural and social fabric of the local community.

3.2. District Cultural Square / ArchSD

The District Cultural Square in Hong Kong is located adjacent to the Tin Hau and Tam Kung local temples, in an area once a fishing village rich in traditional culture. The District Cultural Square provides a perfect venue for theatrical events, such as colorful parades, dragon dances, lion dances, and the performance of traditional operas. The design of the main stage mimics the design of the headdress as the key component of the local opera. From an urban perspective, the District Cultural Square enhances the permeability and connectivity of the area with the once isolated Promenade, Tam Kung Temple, and the waterfront. Its potential for urban activities revitalizes the waterfront and the surroundings by the introduction of the public domain through Transfiguring Tradition.

The District Cultural Square in Hong Kong is an exemplary case study that highlights the potential of architecture in celebrating cultural heritage while fostering urban connectivity and revitalization.

Square pays homage to the area's rich history as a traditional fishing village. The square serves as a vibrant venue for various theatrical events, including colorful parades, dragon dances, lion dances, and performances of traditional operas. By incorporating design elements that mimic the headdresses worn in local operas, the main stage seamlessly blends contemporary architecture with cultural symbolism, creating a space that resonates with the local community's identity.

From an urban planning perspective, the District Cultural Square plays a crucial role in enhancing the permeability and connectivity of the area. Prior to its development, the Promenade, Tam Kung Temple, and the waterfront were isolated entities, disconnected from the surrounding urban fabric. However, the introduction of the District Cultural Square has effectively bridged these disparate elements, creating a cohesive public domain that encourages pedestrian flow and fosters a sense of community.



3.3. Shenzhen Cultural District

The Shenzhen Cultural District, specifically the Nantou Ancient City, is an urbanized village with rich historical and cultural resources. Since 2011, it has undergone urban renewal, and a post-renewal evaluation based on multi-public satisfaction was conducted. The evaluation considered factors such as internal road accessibility, number and distribution of parking lots, quality of night lighting, diversity of greening landscape, aesthetic feeling of the spatial form of the main street, the richness of public space, quality of environmental sanitation, shop decoration aesthetics, harmony of architectural style, display of Shenzhen original culture, change in rent, earnings, rationality of consumer price, abundance of business types, neighborhood relations, sense of community belonging, and public participation.

The post-renewal evaluation of the Nantou Ancient City in the Shenzhen Cultural District provides valuable insights into the multifaceted considerations involved in revitalizing an urbanized village with rich cultural resources. The evaluation encompassed a comprehensive set of factors that aimed to assess the success of the urban renewal project from various perspectives.

By considering internal road accessibility, parking availability, and night lighting, the evaluation addressed the practical aspects of urban infrastructure and accessibility, which are crucial for the smooth functioning and attractiveness of the revitalized area.

The evaluation also considered the aesthetic and environmental aspects, such as the diversity of green spaces, the spatial form of the main street, the richness of public spaces, and the quality of environmental sanitation. These factors contribute to the overall ambiance and livability of the area, ensuring that the renewal efforts not only preserve the cultural heritage but also create an appealing and sustainable urban environment.

Furthermore, the evaluation examined the harmony of architectural styles and the display of Shenzhen's original culture, recognizing the importance of maintaining a cohesive and authentic cultural identity within the revitalized district. This aspect is particularly significant in preserving the area's historical and cultural resources while integrating them into the contemporary urban fabric.

Economic factors, such as changes in rent, earnings, consumer prices, and the abundance of business types, were also considered in the evaluation. These elements are crucial for assessing the economic viability and sustainability of the revitalized district, ensuring that it can thrive and contribute to the local economy.

Notably, the evaluation also considered neighborhood relations, the sense of community belonging, and public participation. These social factors are essential for ensuring that the revitalization efforts resonate with the local community and foster a sense of ownership and pride among residents.



3.4. Saadiyat Island Cultural District

The Saadiyat Island Cultural District in Abu Dhabi is an impressive mixed-use development that seamlessly blends residential, retail, and cultural elements. The project's highlight is the canal front retail area, which activates the waterfront edge with shops and alfresco cafes, creating a vibrant and engaging atmosphere.

The development occupies a substantial site of 10,710 square meters, with a proposed gross construction area of 46,285 square meters. The residential component takes up a significant portion of 39,475 square meters, offering a range of apartment options from one-bedroom units to high-end four-bedroom units and selective penthouses, totaling 197 units.

The signature retail and food & beverage (F&B) component occupies 4,000 square meters, providing a diverse array of shopping and dining experiences. However, the true jewel of the project is the landmark Gastrodome, spanning 2,800 square meters.

The Gastrodome serves as a focal point and a gathering place for residents and visitors alike. It houses three levels of cascading restaurants and a flexible exhibition space that seamlessly flows out onto the canal promenade, creating a dynamic and engaging environment.

The project's medium-rise, seven-story design ensures a harmonious integration with the surrounding environment, while the waterfront edge is activated by the retail and alfresco dining options, fostering a lively and pedestrian-friendly atmosphere.

Overall, the Saadiyat Island Cultural District in Abu Dhabi exemplifies a thoughtful and well-executed mixed-use development that combines residential, retail, and cultural elements in a cohesive and engaging manner, creating a vibrant and attractive destination for residents and visitors alike.

Yemen while incorporating modern design principles and sustainable practices. By creating




4.1. Zain's Story


To translate this symbolic geometry into an architectural form, the design process involved simplifying and deconstructing the Seed of Life pattern. The overlapping circles were separated and transformed into two distinct "C" shapes, interconnected at their ends. This unique configuration not only pays homage to the original geometric form but also serves as a powerful metaphor for the unity and interconnectedness of diverse cultures.

The next step involved cutting and separating the lotus flower shape into two interconnecting "C" forms. This unique design choice was not merely an aesthetic decision but a symbolic representation of the unity and interconnectedness of diverse cultures. The two "C" shapes symbolize how different cultures can come together, interconnected and intertwined, to form a cohesive and harmonious whole. 


4.3.1. Cultural Spaces




53 - Cultural spaces - First floor plan







The open amphitheater design with tiered seating provides an ideal space for community gatherings, events, and performances. A central stage is available for traditional music, dance, and theatrical presentations.






the world to come together and showcase their wares, sharing their stories and traditions with visitors.


