Although many strains and varieties of garden vegetables may be acceptable, some have consistently performed well under our conditions. Suggested vegetable varieties for North Dakota are listed in order of maturity (number of days required to produce a usable product) for each kind of vegetable. Seasonal weather conditions and growing location can influence the amount of time required to mature a given vegetable. We suggest selection of short season varieties for northern sections of the state. Vegetables starred (*) suitable for freezing; all varieties acceptable.

Topcrop	49	Pods round, medium green, some- what curved; use fresh, frozen.
Wade	53	Pods round, dark green, straight; long harvest season. Use fresh or frozen.
Improved Tendergreen	54	More productive than Tendergreen type. Pods set well off the ground.
Royalty	58	Stringless。 Purple pod that turns dark green after cooking。
BEANS (WAX)*		
Topnotch Golden Wax	50	Improved Golden Wax, pods thick- flat, golden-yellow, stringless. Use fresh or frozen. Early.
Pencil Pod BlackWax	56	Popular for home freezing. Very productive.
BEANS (POLE)		
Blue Lake	67	Good climber with pod set from base to top of plant. Excellent for freezing.
BEANS (DRY)		
Great Northern	90	Seed long flattened-oval, white, considerably larger than navy beans. Baking or dry shell variety.
Michelite	92	Improved navy bean. Seeds white, small, rounded oval. High yielding. Excellent for baking.
BEANS (LIMA)*		
Henderson Bush for trial	65	Dependable. Very uniform growth. Table or freezing.
BEETS*		Beet greens are an excellent source of vitamin A.
Ruby Queen	52	Round with smooth shoulders and crown. Small tap root.
Detroit Dark Red	58	Globe shaped, skin dark red, flesh deep blood red.
Sweetheart	60	Extra sweet, tender, solid red color, good for pickling.
BROCCO		Plant transplants. Use while buds are small and tight; do not allow heads to flower.

Gemini	61	Gynoecious hybrid. Heavy yielder.

Michihli	75	Heads long and cylindrical, crisp, tender. Mild flavor. Used chiefly for salads. Plant seed June 1-10.
CARROTS*		Excellent source of Vitamin A.
Pioneer for trial	67	Hybrid, early, uniform size and type. Roots smooth. Good flavor.
Nantes (Coreless)	68	Narrow cylindrical shape; medium long with slight taper and blunt tip. Crisp and tender.
Red Cored Chantenay	68	Reddish-orange, uniform, tender and sweet. Core about same color as flesh. For storage, freezing and canning.
CAULIFLOWER*		Set out transplants about May 15-20. All must be tied as soon as curd is visible.
White Horse for trial	55	Very uniform with deep mounded firm snow white heads.
Snowball Variety M.	59	Extra vigorous, large smooth white heads, well protected by inner fold leaves. Be certain to choose type M.
SWISS CHARD		
Lucullus	50	Leaves yellowish green, heavily crumpled with cream colored slender midrib.

LETTUCE (BUTTER- HEAD)		
Summer Bibb 6		Slow bolting; can be grown almost throughout the season.
Buttercrunch	64	Vigorous, very attractive, delicious leaves with tender ribs.
LETTUCE (HEAD)	100	
Pennlake	72	Head medium to small. Interior crisp and firm. Best variety.
Premier Great Lakes	75	Head uniformly large, early, dark green, slightly ribbed and solid.
LETTUCE (LEAF)		
Black Seeded Simpson	44	Large, upright, compact, leaves light green, broad and frilled. Good quality.
Grand Rapids	45	Popular loose leaf variety capable of continuous growth under adverse conditions.
Slobolt	48	Grand Rapids type. Stands longer than other loose leaf types.
MUSKMELON		Set out 20 day old transplants for early crop. For more earliness and higher yield, use clear plastic mulch.
Minnesota Midget	60	Early, small fruited (4 inch) short vine type.
Wheat City for trial	60	Canadian variety, extremely early. Sets fruit despite adverse weather.
Delicious 51 Se Transpla	eds 90 ints 78	Large oval to round fruits; coarsely netted. Orange flesh; quality good in warm seasons.
Gold Star Hybrid Seeds 94 Transplants 80		Oval fruit, medium size, heavily netted with firm rind; flesh orange. High quality despite adverse weather.
ONIONS		Direct seed or transplant for larger size.
Early Yellow Globe	98	Medium large, globe to flattened globe, skin tough, light yellow, flesh firm and white.
Ebenezer (sets)	105	Medium size thick-flattened, small neck. Skin yellow, flesh fine textured, mild, very firm.
Epoch (seed) 108		Medium large, deep round in shape, firm flesh and dark yellow skin.
Southport Red Globe 110		Medium large, deep globe shaped, small neck, skin dark glossy red, flesh fine grained.
Southport White Globe 110		Medium size, globe shaped. Skin pure white, flesh ivory-white, fine grained, mild flavor.

Little Marvel	62	Plants about 1½ feet tall; productive. 7-8 peas per pod.

Wando	70	Large upright vine, peas medium large; good quality.
PEPPERS*		Set out transplants.
Merrimack Wonder	63	Very early. Yields under adverse conditions.
Vinedale	64	Small plants, medium size, tapere use for early red peppers.
Lincoln Belle	65	Sets good quality fruit during coo early summer season. Large, blocky, high quality.
