Although many strains and varieties of garden vegetables may be acceptable, some have consistently performed well under our conditions. Suggested vegetable varieties for North Dakota are listed in order of maturity (number of days required to produce a usable product) for each kind of vegetable. Seasonal weather conditions and growing location can influence the amount of time required to mature a given vegetable. We suggest selection of short season varieties for northern sections of the state. Vegetables starred (*) suitable for freezing; all varieties acceptable.

Vine crops, though commonly planted in hills, would be best grown in rows with plants spaced one to two feet apart.
